## Persuading Those Fish to Bite

You can't pick up a fishing magazine without reading about the various techniques involved in triggering those stubborn fish to bite. Every television fishing celebrity has their special retrieve or presentation. Don't forget the barrage of marketing messages in all of those commercials and advertisements. You have to get this lure, that fluorocarbon leader, the latest fish scent, the red hooks, or the latest banjo minnow.

Let's face the hard facts: Those fish don't read magazines or watch television! All those so-called experts and advertising executives seem to have forgotten about the uncanny ability of those fish beneath the boat to figure out exactly what is going on up top. Over the last hundred thousand years, fish have developed a certain awareness or sixth sense of what those crazy fishermen are doing.

With the help of my counterpart Dan M., I have compiled a list of fisherman tactics that will almost guarantee a fish to bite when all of those common wisdoms fail:

- If you been unsuccessful in a certain area, loudly announce that the next will be your **Last Cast** before departing. This puts the fish on alert, that if they are going to strike, it better be now.
- In a similar vein, you can loudly announce that you are now **Out of Bait** and that you are using the last worm, minnow, or leech. This will surely trigger the fish's inherent greed causing it to hit that bait before some other fish can get there.
- Another sure-fire method to trigger a strike, is to create a large bird's nest in your reel. If you forgot your bifocals to untangle the

reel, you can also generate that strike equally as well by wrapping the line around the trolling motor, transducer, or anchor line.

- It's always important to stay alert, but just put down that rod to grab a sandwich, pour a cup of coffee, or pop a beer/soda and you almost will guarantee a strike, and probably miss it.
- Using more than one rod will always trigger a strike. Just put one rod down and pick up another rod. Bingo! There goes the first bobber. Plus using the second rod also enhances the odds for tangles and lost fish. If fish could smile, this would be the time.
- Probably the most sure fire way of triggering a strike is to answer nature's call. As soon as you put down the rod and start looking for the coffee can or plastic bottle, any fish in that entire bay will start heading for your line. The odds almost increase to 100% if you have to work your way through four layers of ice fishing clothing.

All joking aside, the real way to increase the odds of triggering or catching fish is KNOWLEDGE. Forget about the advertising hype. Read in-depth articles contained in serious magazines like *In-Fisherman*. Fish with other accomplished fisherman and replicate their techniques. Attend seminars, take

notes, and ask questions of the professionals. Better yet, join a quality fishing club like Arlington Anglers, and acquire that knowledge that you need. Listen to top notch speakers; share articles, techniques, or fishing reports; go fishing with other fishermen who have proven techniques and are familiar with the lake, river, or species. 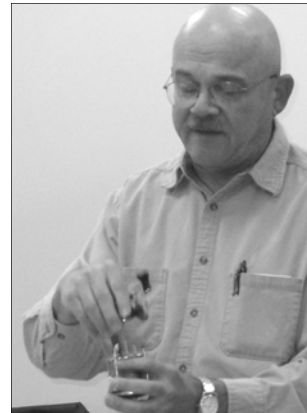
Over 50 people attended the Club's

*Joel Janecek, a.k.a. The Reel Guy, demonstrates his quality reel cleaning methods at the November meeting.*

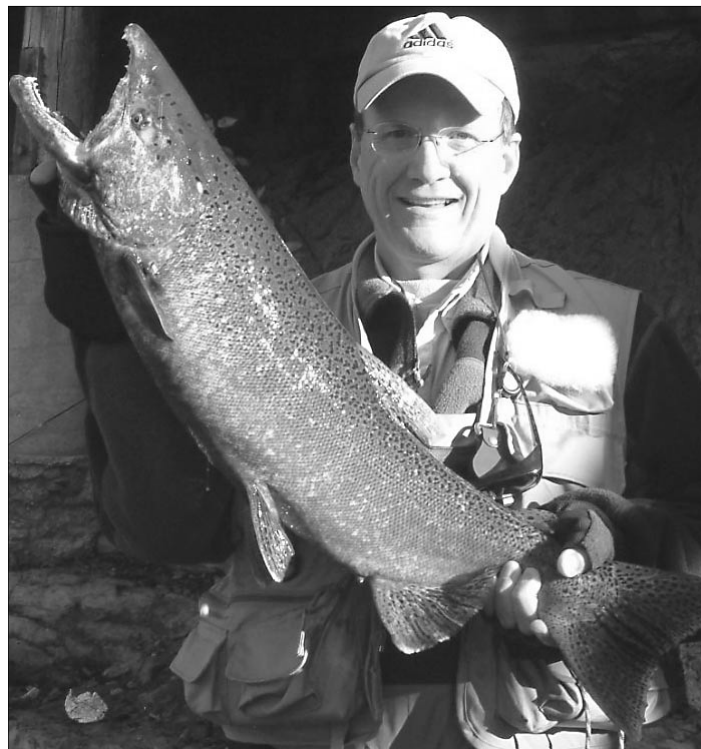
