

# Bass Techniques for all Conditions

## *Arlington Anglers Fishing Club*

If you haven't noticed, fishing for smallmouth bass can change on a lake from one day to the next (if not one hour to another). The equation gets more complex if you throw in all the other variables like time of year, weather (air temperature, wind, barometer), water temperature, etc. How can you possibly synthesize all these variables into a plan that will result in a successful smallie outing?

At the Arlington Angler's January meeting, Jim DeRosa laid out his techniques that could help improve your next search for that bronze back. Jim emphasized the importance of keeping it simple but using all of the information that you may have available to you.

- Get some good maps of your lake. Talk to locals or the bait shop to help mark up the maps initially.
- Use your fish finder to look for structure. Record GPS waypoints on subtle structure not found on the hydrographical maps.
- Get out on the lake right after ice out when the water is gin clear. Locate those boulders that will be SM magnets for all of the summer.
- Match retrieve speeds with the water temp and resulting metabolism rates. If it is cold, slow it down. If the water is warm, try some quick retrieves or darting lures.
- If the fish out of this lake have crawfish in their stomachs, start off with crawfish colored crank baits or tube jigs.
- Keep the line as thin as you can. Jim suggests using an 8 lb fluorocarbon leader with an 8 lb braid. Use a very visible color on your main line as some strikes are very subtle and may be only recognizable as the line moving in an unusual direction.

Lastly Jim keeps a detailed log on every fishing trip recording all the variables that I mentioned above. He also includes sketches of spots/structures that worked well that day. If Jim is going out on an early June day, he searches thru his old logs looking for a day or two with similar variables and uses that log info to formulate a plan for the day.

Jim DeRosa [fishsmallmouthbass.com](http://fishsmallmouthbass.com) is an experienced fishing guide, writer and radio host. His "Fishing and Outdoor Radio Show" has been on the air since 1983, making it one of the longest running outdoor radio shows in the nation.
